# SMALL PART OF PERSONAL PROPERTY ASSESSED

### Millions of Dollars in Property Escape Taxation in Nebraska

Startling Condition of Affairs that Ought to Be Remedied Without Delay

(Issued under Authority of the Railroads of Nebraska.)

In the first article which we published we called attention to the fact that all railroad property, their earnings and their operations were reported periodically in such manner that any information regarding their value or operation was easily obtained, and that this feature worked a great injustice to them in matters of taxation, from the fact that a private corporation, or a person, can refrain from returning his property for taxes, and that under the Constitution and laws of the State of Nebraska there was no way of compelling discovery of in-

We give below a table of some remarkable figures in regard to this feature of the question, and will continue to give some comparisons between the amounts returned for taxation in 1900 and the amounts returned to the census enumerator in the same year. In the matter of live stock, the following table from the last census is interesting:

When it is considered that the value of livestock for 1900 was reported at \$6.79 for horses, \$4.66 for cattle, \$7.41 for mules, \$0.47 for sheep and \$0.99 for hogs, and then take into consideration the fact that this great number as shown above was omitted entirely from assessment, it makes a startling showing.

creased the assessment value of livestock by \$9,116,-301.13, even when extended at the remarkably low valuations given above.

As it was, over 35 per cent of all the live stock values of the State were omitted entirely in that year.

Other interests make no better showing. The following intrests in the state returned for taxation in 1900 the amounts given below:

It is confusing to see the amount of money, credits, stocks, bonds, etc., returned in the Bank Register and other sources of information regarding banks and brokers and try to connect them with the amount of wealth returned for taxation, and when it is found that the manufacturers report \$71,982,127 as being invested in their business, with \$23,201,553 worth of machinery, tools and implements, it makes the sums returned for taxation look ridiculous.

It is evident that not one-third of the personal property in the state is returned at all for taxation. and that fully one-quarter of the tangible visible property that assessors should see and estimate in their returns is omitted through carelessness.

If all the property of the State were included in tax returns, Nebraska would show more than \$161 per capita for taxation, which is the lowest of from the assessment rolls in 1900, it would have in- any of the western or northern states.
