

TURGEONS STAY IN STATE

Acting Governor Steele Refuses to Honor Requisition from South Dakota.

FILES ANSWER IN POLICE BOARD CASE

Heavy Rains Have Had No Effect on Streams Used for Irrigation and Flow of Water is Now Below Normal.

Lincoln, June 21.—(Special).—At the conclusion of a long-drawn hearing Acting Governor Steele this afternoon denied the requisition from the governor of South Dakota for C. W. Turgeon, Voltaire Turgeon and Adolphe Turgeon, who reside near Dakota City, for trial on the charge of shooting with intent to do great bodily harm.

The case presented several peculiar features. The Turgeons occupy land near Dakota City, the title to which has long been in dispute. About a month ago a posse of deputy sheriffs of South Dakota arrived on the homestead and attempted to take possession. They met the settlers and a dispute ensued in which several shots were fired by both sides, some of which took effect. The officers were unable to make the arrest or gain possession of the land and made haste to the South Dakota capital to get out a legal process. In the meantime the Turgeons were traveling with all possible speed to the Nebraska capital to get a requisition for the deputy sheriffs. The Nebraska requisition was denied by the governor of South Dakota on the ground that the shooting occurred in that state.

At all and that the governor of Nebraska had no jurisdiction in the case.

In denying the South Dakota requisition Acting Governor Steele gives a similar reason, though its application is different. He holds that the shooting occurred in Nebraska territory and that men cannot be taken to South Dakota for trial. The deputy sheriffs were outside of their jurisdiction when the trouble occurred and their only recourse is to begin proceedings in a Nebraska court.

Answer in Police Board Case.

The attorney general's office has made another contribution to the literature of the Omaha Fire and Police commission case. It is in the nature of a reply to the motion of C. C. Wright for a rehearing. The document is prepared by Norris Brown, assistant attorney general, and is as follows:

Replying to the brief of counsel for the relator in this case we call your honor's attention to the fact that the single authority cited in this brief, heretofore rendered in this case, is not the law of the state of Nebraska.

The case of the State against Futor, 5 Am. Dec. 182, was a suit between individuals over an office and had nothing to do with the present case. The relator in this case is a public officer and the office in question is a public office.

So in the case of Hurd against Heck, 45 Pac. Rep. the state was not a party. It was a lawsuit between individuals over the possession of an office to which each was claiming his own election. When the case was called on for trial the relator, having the term of office had passed, neither party to the suit had any title to the office as the relator's term of office had expired and there was nothing to be determined by the court.

The original Moore case and the Kennedy case were each brought by the chief law officer of the state to determine the power of the relator to remove a member of the board. That was the thing adjudicated and the question determined. The state was a party and the board was the relator.
