Convention Two Days Off and No Orystaliration of Sentiment on Candidates.

ALLEN PERSISTENTLY URGES BRYAN

Large Number of Men in a Receptive

Mood for Head of the Ticket, with Little Talk About the Remainder.

LINCOLN. June 22 .- (Special.) - All eyes in the fusion camp are directed toward Grand Island, where the state convention of both democrats and populists will assemble simultaneously Tuesday afternoon to go through the listless form of putting up a state ticket to be rejected by the voters of Nebraska at the coming election. Although the fusionists are right up against their conventions, none of them are rash nough to attempt to predict with any certainty what the makeup of the ticket will be. Whether the gubernatorial nomination should be offered to Mr. Bryan and whether he would accept it if it were offered to him and what kind of a run he would make if he did accept are the questions most often propounded and receiving the most divergent answers. While there has been more or less talk about Bryan for governor for many months, the Bryan boom as formally launched looks to former Senator William V. Allen as its sponsor. Judge Allen proposed the presentation of the nomination on a silver platter to Mr. Bryan in his paper a few weeks ago, and has persistently kept up his advocacy of this course, notwithstanding the repeated assertions of Mr. Bryan that he was not a candidate and did not want to have the nom-

ination forced upon him. In the last issue of his paper, just published, Judge Allen makes this final plea:

The nomination of J. H. Mickey of Osceola for governer by the republican state convention makes it important that the fusionists use some degree of foresight in nominating a candidate at the forthcoming Grand Island conventions.

Mr. Mickey is a banker and has no political record, the latter fact being an element of strength. He is said to be better than his party, and it is to be hoped that this statement is true. That he can be beaten we have no doubt, but he cannot be defeated by every merely "good fellow" that may be nominated.

Mr. Bryan should be nominated without the slightest contention. The nomination should be tendered him unanimously and by acclamation, and there should be no struggle or contest. By doing so and nominating an equally strong subordinate ticket we can redeem Nebraska from republican domination and by a judicious administration hold it for all time.

This is not a year for grand-stand candidates; we should not nominate a man simply because he is a pleasant man and would make a good governor, unless we are satisfied he can be elected. The nomines should be a man whose election is placed beyond a doubt and who, when elected, will manifest ability and administer the affairs of the state in an acceptable manner.


