whereas, The president of August 20, 1901, issued his proclamation stating that he has been advised by the Louisiana Purchase Exposition commission, pursuant to the provisions of section 9 of the act of congress approved March 3, 1901, entitled "An act to provide for celebrating the lotth anniversary of the purchase or the Louisiana territory by the United States by holding an international exhibition of arts, industries, manufactures and products of the soil, mine, forest and sea in the city of St. Louis, in the state of Missouri, that provision had been made for grounds and buildings for the uses specified in the said mentioned act of congress.

Whereas, it was declared and proclaimed by the president in his aforesaid proclamation that such international exhibition would be opened in the city of St. Louis, in the state of Missouri, not later than the first day of December thereafter, and.

Whereas, Section 8 of the act of congress, approved June 28, 1902, entitled "An act making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1903 and for other purposes, fixes a subsequent date for the holding of the said international exhibition and specifically states that said commission shall provide for the dedication of the buildings of the Louisiana Purchase exposition in said city of St. Louis not later than the 30th day of April, 1903, with appropriate ceremonies, and thereafter said exposition shall be opened to visitors at such time designated by said company, but not later than the ist day of December thereafter.
