DES MOINES, July 4 .- (Special.)-It is planned by the republicans of this city that nearly half a block of Fourth street will he placed under canvas for the coming republican state convention to be used as a convention lobby. It will be closed to traffic and kept clean for the use of the delegates to the convention. 


