

PARKE WILSON GOES TO JAIL

Denver Manager Arrested for Assaulting Umpire Swigert.

DISGRACEFUL EXHIBITION MARS A GAME

Enraged by a Decision Head of Official Undertakes to East Offender and Trifle Police

It remained for Parke Wilson, manager of the Denver base ball team, to break all records for rowdiness on the Omaha ball field. He made a most vicious assault on Umpire Swigert yesterday afternoon, and when the police interfered, changed his assault from the umpire to an officer. He was placed under arrest and sent to the city jail.

Offense to the Women.

Wilson's offense is all the more serious because fully half of the 4,500 people present were women. Manager Rourke has been particularly anxious this season to build up support among the women of Omaha, and his efforts have been quite successful. It is in nowise the fault of the home management that such an exhibition of rowdiness was afforded on ladies' day, but the effect can be but too plainly seen.
