WANTS WEST TO BE UNITED G. H. Maxwell Talks Against Factional Differences on Irri-

gation Plans. At the Commercial club yesterday noon George H. Maxwell, executive chaleman of the National Irrigation association, addressed the executive committee of the club and a few invited guests, some twenty-five

in all, on the subject of irrigation. He said in part: "I urge that the west stand united on this question. It should not split up on matters of local advantage; there should be no cross-howling for sectional benefits. The west should stand solidly by the administration in whatever it does. From the president down, through the geological survey to the hydrographical department, they are all anxious to do the best thing and the biggest thing, and the west should

be a unit for them and their action. "In this way can lasting and monumental works of irrigation be achieved. I may say that if the works built in the next two years with the \$10,000,000 that will available are constructed according to the ideas of the geological survey it will mean the successful launching of the whole great project. The works will be an object esson and their success will result in a sentiment among the people of this country. that will make it easy from then on to get legislation and funds for building as rapidly as the settlers take the land. That

should be the test. "This thing should not be gone into upon a minor scale. We should build gigantic works, not innumerable small ones, We should evolve something that will be an example to all the world. And to that end the geological survey in its selection of the sites for these dams and main canals must have the hearty support of the total
