ENGLISH THE BEST ROWERS HASTEN CANAL NEGOTIATIONS

State Department Begins Finals for Conclusion of Definite Treaty with Colombia.

WASHINGTON, July 9 .- Final negotiations for the conclusion of the definite treaty between the United States and Colombia, which is to authorize the construction of the Panama canal, began at the State department today at a meeting between Secretary Hay and Mr. Cromnwell, representing the Panama Canal company, and the Colombian legation here.

At the same time, in order that the settlement of the legal questions connected with the transfer of the canal company's property to this government might run on concurrently with the diplomatic settlements between the United States and Colombia, Mr. Cromwell, at Secretary Hay's instance, laid before the Department of Justice all the papers in his possession calculated to assure the attorney general in his work in settling the title.

After conferring verbally with Mr. Crommass of papers, which the counsel examined very carefully. While a definite conclusion was not reached at today's meeting, it is stated that distinct advance was made toward the end. Some correspondence must be had with the Colombian government, but this can be done by cable, and it is berectly off the Bucks shore, giving the boats lieved that the treaty can be signed within week.

> PASSES SUCCESSFUL TRIAL Torpedo Boat Destroyer Paul Jones Complies with All the Conditions.

WASHINGTON, July 9 .- The Navy department has received telegrams from the Union Iron works and from Lieutenant Fenton of the trial board of San Francisco announcing that the torpedo boat destroyer Paul Jones had passed a successful trial. The Heutenant says:

"Official trial maximum speed, 28.91 knots on 336 revolutions and 7,900 horse power; 27.42 knots for one hour at 322 revolutions."

Originally Paul Jones was required to make thirty knots on a standardizing trial, but this requirement was reduced to twenty-eight, and on the hour's run the reguirement was reduced to twenty-seven knots, so the boat has complied with the trial conditions.

The Navy department has accepted preliminarily the torpedo boat destroyer Perry, built by the Union Iron works.

IN SOUTH DAKOTA Census Bureau Issues a Report Showing Agriculture Statistics of the State.

WASHINGTON, July 9 .- The census bureau today made public a bulletin on agriculture in South Dakota. It shows that in the census year 1900 there were 52,622 farme in the state, valued at \$220,133,190. and covering an area of 19,070,616 acres, or about 39 per cent of the total area of the state. The live stock held on the farms s valued at \$65,173,432 and farm machinery \$12,218,680, making the total of farm prop-erty for the state \$297,695,802.

The report places the value of farm prodects for 1899 at \$66,082,419, of which \$21,-908,804 goes to the audit of the live stock


