WARRANTS READY ABOUT AUGUST FIRST

Five Thousand Dollars and Others Have Large Claims Pending.

With the county assessment and levy determined, the county clerk's force finds itself confronted with work that will occupy more than two weeks and the county's creditors are warned that it will he useless to apply for warrants before August 1.

At their meeting next Saturday morning the commissioners probably wfli pass appropriation sheets Nos. 1 and 2, which are about ready, but the passing of them will be comparatively a small matter so far as time is concerned. No. 1 represents 3,170 warrants and No. 2 represents 900 warrants. These warrants are still in the hands of the printer, who could not put them through the press until the levy was known, as it is necessary to print the amount of the levy on each one, together with the amount representing the 85 per cent of the funds on which the board is allowed to draw before collection of taxes is made. After the warrants come from the printer there will have to be written on each the date, number, to whom issued, for what, the total of expenditure voted to that date and the signatures of the county clerk.
