City officials or employes will not be paid any salaries until personal taxes are paid. City Clerk Shrigley has been instructed to see to it that the amount due

the city from any claimant is deducted from While taxes have been coming in rapidly there seems to be a desire on the part of Mayor Koutsky and the council to collect all personal taxes as rapidly as possible and in order to set a good example the orders mentioned have been issued by the council and approved by the mayor. This plan was carried out. The mayor proposes to go ahead now and insist that the rule be observed. In this way the city will receive quite a sum of money it would not other-

City Clerk Shrigley made the statement yesterday afternoon that up to the present time not a single new appointee on the fire rest it has been the custom for both firemen and policemen to file bonds. A surety company bond is required. Chief of Police Briggs is the only member of the police force among the recent appointees who has filed a bond. The officers who hold over are bonded for two years, consequently there is no necessity for them to renew their bonds at this time. As only a few of the officers who served under Mayor Kelly are on duty now the majority of the force are worrying along and working without a bond of any sort.
