

MILWAUKEE COMES IN FIRST

Duffy's Angels Lead Second Game by a Wide Margin.

OWEN AND STONE OFF IN THEIR WORK

Omaha Unable to Transact Business with Mr. McPherson at Times

When Hits Would Have Meant Runs.

It was a peculiar game in which Milwaukee defeated Omaha Saturday by a score of 5 to 2. The Angels doubled the errors of the Rangers, and McPherson gave all the gifts bases for the day. Stone missed on a long fly from the first man up and O'Brien got clear round to third. Then Cockman and McVicker went out in succession, which should have made the three. With O'Brien only a sack from home Thornton singled and scored him. The big first baseman stole second and then Duffy belted a safe one to Stone, who made another error on it, letting it through his mitt. The ninth inning Graham out with a three-bagger to start things, second, while Thornton crossed the plate. Owens pulled in and pitched four one, two, three innings in a row, but in the sixth O'Brien and Cockman led off with singles, and stuff was off again. McVicker batted the ball to the infield and the play was made to catch O'Brien at third. He failed, so there were three on bases. Thornton flew out and Duffy came in with a timely double, scoring the first two sack retainers. In the eighth Gatin's safe scored Duffy, who had made first on Selder's choice, Dolan throwing Thornton out at home.
