power drills will soon be installed.

Aspen and Globe Show Up Well. The Aspen group, owned by William Rosenbaum, is being developed by a number of tunnels which are following a large body of free-milling ore. Shamrock Makes Good Shipment.

DEADWOOD, S. D., July 13 .- (Special.) --The Shamrock mine made anotchr shipment of ore to the Omaha smelter on Friday of twenty-eight tons. The last shipment from this mine before the last netted the owners, Mesers, Christian, Brosnahan & Cunningham, about \$48 a ton. It is a silver-lead ore, which carries forty-eight ounces of silver to the ton and runs about 29% per cent lead, besides carrying some

gold values. The ore occurs in the flat formations on top of the quartalte, and the seam of ore which is being worked is from eighteen inches to two feet thick, but coming up through the quartzite are number of pipes of ore which when followed down carry gold values in increasing richness. No etfort has been made to follow down any of these pipes, for when a little depth has been attained the water has come in so fast that it cannot be handled without putting in an expensive pumping plant, and this the owners at the present time are unable to do, so they have contented themselves with working a small force on the flat ore measures and shipping the ore to Omaha for treatment. The mine is located on the Strawberry divide, about four and a half miles south of Deadwood, in a district which is producing at the present time

some very rich gold ore.
