NEW YORK, July 18.—Today was another animated day in the stock market with aggregate sales of over a million shares. The strength and variety of the market had no new developments to account for it, but the large capital which has embarked upon the project of putting up prices and inviting an outside following pursued their operations with apparently unabated confidence.

These operators are apparently firm in the conviction that the public sentiment of the country has arrived at that stage of confidence in the success of the year's crops, the continued prosperity of all lines of industry and the sufficiency of the money resources of the country, that the example of a vigorous upward movement occuples stock is all that is needed to induce them to come into the market and buy stocks freely and boldly, thus affording a medium for the liquidation of the holdings which the capitalists are taking on in the rise.

The leaders of today's market were Pennsylvania and affiliated railroads. Southern Railway was brought into the movement in a way to make it appear that closer relations than those now existing might be in prospect between the two properties.
