Change in Uniforms. The change in the uniforms of officers and men in the army directed by an order of the secretary of war, just issued, will be made this fall.

All the officers are now giving orders for the new uniform, for the order issued puts the uniform in effect "at once, at the convenience of the officers," but it will be compulsory by January 1 next.

GRAVE CHARGES ARE MADE

Anti-Imperialists Score Actions of United States Soldiers in the Philippines.

ADOPT OPEN LETTER TO THE PRESIDENT

George Root's Commendation of Conduct of Warfare and Alliance Good Name of the Country Is Implicated.

LAKE GEORGE, N. Y., July 27.—At a meeting of representative anti-imperialists held in New York last spring a committee was appointed to investigate army conditions in the Philippines. That committee has since been prosecuting its inquiries. President Roosevelt's recent review of the court-martial of General Jacob H. Smith seemed to the committee to demand some reply and at a meeting just held at Lake George an open letter to the president was adopted.

Especially opportune in our judgment is your very commendable recommendation that in a warfare as that recently waged by General Smith, the military connection with the previous memorandum of April 15 that revealed the truth, be followed by corresponding general action, in our opinion, do much toward the re-establishment of the moral of the army.

While this, however, expressing our sense of high official duty, we have no desire to call your attention to certain conclusions which we have in the course of our own investigation found ourselves compelled to reach.

Believe Other Culprits Exist. The inquiries we, as a committee, have made, necessarily incomplete, have yet been sufficient to satisfy us that General Smith and Major Waller were not the sole culprits, nor should they suffice in the character of scapegoats.

RESTFUL DAY AT OYSTER BAY. President Receives No Official Visitors and Mail Is Not Delivered.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., July 27.—President Roosevelt passed a quiet Sunday at Sagamore hill. In the morning, accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, Mrs. Emilio Roosevelt, Lieutenant Ferguson, formerly a member of the Rough Riders, and a number of other children, he attended services at the Episcopal church.
