**Son of Joe Patchen Goes Distance in Triflo Over Two Minutes.**

After scoring three times, during which Geers showed a disposition to hold back Lord Derby, Starter Walker gave the word to go. The Boston horse outstripped Lord Derby from the start. He took possession of the pole at the first turn and held it all the way. The horses were about a length apart until the homestretch was reached. As they came toward the wire Lord Derby swerved and broke, and Boralma came under the wire four lengths ahead of Geers.

Loud cheering marked the finish of the heat. As the horses came to the track for the second heat, Geers expressed confidence that Lord Derby would win. The horses got off promptly and Boralma led until a distance pole was passed; then Lord Derby drew up and shot by Boralma. The Boston horse followed gamely and rallied, but the rally was followed by a break and he crossed the wire two lengths behind Lord Derby. In this heat Boralma showed signs of lameness. Time, 2:09 1/4.

In the third heat Boralma once more took the lead at the start, but his advantage was short-lived. He broke at the turn and again at the stretch. As the racers came toward the wire it was plainly evident that something serious had happened to Boralma.
