Rapid Advance in Methods. DEARTH OF RECORDS AND LITERATURE

English Surgeons in India Could Render Little Assistance to Americans in Fighting Tropical Maindies, Says Col. Turrell.

Colonel Henry S. Turrell, deputy surgeon eneral of the United States army, chief urgeon of the Department of the Philipcines, throws considerable light upon the ifficulties under which the medical departpent of the army has labored since the orces of this government took possession of those islands. He said:

"When the surgeons of the United States army and their assistants arrived in the Philippines they found a condition conronting them which they had never before encountered. The army had been but a short time in Cuba and the observation of medical authors on the diseases of the subtropical countries of the northern hemisphere were of little use to the men who rere called upon to treat, in the field and in the hospital camps, men who were particularly subject to disease by reason of the sudden change in climate.

Dysentery Raises Death Rate.

"The greatest trouble we had at first was with the amoebic dysentery. This is a disease peculiar to the eastern countries. It has been noticed by authors very briefly, although known to the English physicians in India ever since that country was occupied by British troops. It seems strange that they have never treated of it at greater length in the publications, but aside from a brief reference in some of the books the authorities have ignored it. This disease was therefore poculiarly distressing, as the treatment made by the surgeons was largely experimental, and at first the death rate was very high. As a sequel of the attack of the disease there follows abscess of the liver, requiring operation. peration the patient will recover and there is little fear of a recurrence of the disease if the patient is removed to temper ate zones, but it will recur when the patient remains in the tropics, and so the surgeons have generally adopted the rule of sending the men home as soon as they recover from the operation.

Concerning the Cholers.

This inspector was deceived as to the source of origin of a cargo of vegetables and it reached an American firm doing business in Manila from an infroted district. As a result of this shipment the disease appeared in Manila and the government tracing it to its source prepared to confiscate and destroy the cargo. The owners, hearing of the move of the government, loaded the infected regetables upon a boat and consigned it to Hollo, the capital of the district where I had charge.
