It is known that the intention of article 2 was to prevent my extraordinary issue of bonds for the purpose of redeeming the bonds of the so-called republic previous to the Spanish-American war and the payment of large bounties to those who had taken part in the insurrection against Spain. It was intended as a check upon the Cuban govproment in the matter of incurring inebtedness, although it carries no proof the United States should the Cuban gov ernment exceed the indebtedness pro-hibited by the amendment.
