RELICS IN DEMAND Clothing, Cartridges and Locks of Hair Are Divided Among an

Anglous Crowd. SPORANE, Wash., Aug. 7.—When the sheriff, with the body of Tracy, Jrove through Davesport, hundreds of people followed up and crowded about the wagon. By the time the wagon reached Stone's morgue the atreets were crowded and from every corner could be heard "Three cheers

for Lincoln county."
The town was wild. The morgue doors had to be closed and the crowd was asked to stand back. Several persons were alowed to see the body and then trouble egan. Everyone wanted a relic, and in a nort time nothing was left but the body. Semence even picked up the blood-stained bandkerchief which had been used by fracy to keep from bleeding to death. Many locks of the dead man's hair were arried away and in many places his bead

had been made bald. His trousers were cut into strips and before they were di-vided they were cut into smaller pieces. Many of Tracy's cartridges were diided among the members of the posse and hose that could get at the buckskin bag. DAVENPORT, Wash., Aug. 7 .- The curbus are flocking to Davenport from all lirections to view the body of Harry Tracy. the dead outlaw. The inquest has been tarfed at the courthouse, but the body is still at the undertaker's rooms. The inuest will not likely be concluded till tocorrow, as witnesses from Gregon can sardly get in today.

The body probably will be taken to Spokane on Saturday and later sent to Salem, Ore., for burlal at the penitentiary. Tracy's guns may be distributed among the Creston pass. His other relics have already been given away.

Another story of Tracy's wenderful darhas come to light. Mr. McGregor, the keeper of a livery stable at Wilhur, on viewing Tracy's body, positively identified Tracy as a man who came to his stable last uraday night. He (Tracy) had two horses which he put up for the night. He also left his rife and a bundle, asking the unsuspecting liveryman to take care of them until-morning. Where he spent the night is not known, though it is said he ate at least one meal in a restaurant in the town. About 10 a. m., Saturday he called for his horses, bundle, and riffe, paid his bill and rode

away. It is prohable that the \$4,100 reward for Outlaw Tracy will not be paid for some time, owing to the number of claimants, The body will be taken to Salem at the conclusion of the inquest at Davenport, Wash. Governor Gear has already stated that he was willing for the state to pay the re-ward as soon as proper identification shall be made, but the reward will not be pair until the claimants reach an agreement. It now seems likely that the aid of the courts will be invoked. It is said that Govrnor Gear will also favor the payment of the \$1,500 to Mrs. Waggoner for Merrill's body at the same time the reward is paid for Tracy. Governor McBride of Washington has announced that he will act in acerdance with the decision of the Salein sutherities in paying the reward.
