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Twinkle Takes Big Purse

Hudson Lays Back on First Heat, but Wins the Next Three.

DAN PATCH GOES AGAINST HIS TIME

Owing to 2:10 Wind He Falls to Lower Record, but Finds Same Clip Without Any Pressure.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—Seven thousand spectators today saw the best trotting and pacing records for the season in races were made. In the first race of today, the 2:10 novelty trot, Susie J. won the second heat in 2:08 1-2, and in the special race between Prince Albert and Anacosta the former paced in 2:03 1-4. The best previous records of the season in races were the Monk, trotting 2:07 and Dan Patch, pacing 2:03 3-4.

The fastest time of the season was made against the watch by Dan Patch, 2:00 3-4, was duplicated.

It was the gala day of the grand circuit meet at Brighton Beach, and for a rather stiff breeze the pacing record might have gone.

The 2:10 trot was the opener and before the first heat Pereno sold at 50 to 20 for the field. Aggie Medium had the pole. Louisie Mac took the lead, with Pereno at her wheel and York Boy within striking distance. The race was close, but Louisie Mac was never headed and she won by two lengths. In this heat Susie J. failed a seventh, yet she was an even money choice for the second heat, and with the word she shot off to the quarter in 51 seconds and to the half in 1:01 1-2, with York Boy and Pereno fighting it out for second place.

The favorite came home six lengths ahead showing up in 2:06 1-2. York Boy was a 6 to 5 choice in the third heat, and after All Right had led to the half, he went to the front and the race was over.

He brought \$5,000 purse for the 2:10 pacers had a big field, yet Twinkle sold for \$100 to \$150 for the field.

Where Twinkle Wins. Don Derby started out on the most sensational style and led the field to the half in 1:01 1-4, and came home in 2:06, with Terrace Queen three lengths back. He was now the choice at 2 to 1 and again led to the half in 1:01 1-4, but at the distance Twinkle shot to the front and won by an open length. It was now 100 to 50 to Twinkle, but it was a close call, as she only won the next heat by a neck from York Boy. In the deciding heat Twinkle had it all her own way.

The talent led 100 to 25 on Prince Alert against Anacosta. The race was hardly ever in doubt, as the favorite led all the way in each heat.

For the special it was announced that Dan Patch would not squeak his own record of 2:00 3-4 and Star Pointer's record of 1:59 3-4. He was accompanied by two runners. He went to the quarter in 30 seconds, and to the half in 1:00 3-4. The three-quarters was passed in 1:31 and he came home without pressure in 2:00, equalling his record.

For the 2:10 pace novelty the road going Albert was the choice at even money for the first heat and he beat a poor field in 2:14. For the second heat Orrin B. won by six lengths. Dick Wilson was a 2 to 5 favorite for the third heat, but it was won by Orrin B. in the slow time of 2:18 1-4.
