UNION PROTESTS

Mail steamer Korea arrived here on the steamer Gaelic. Collector of Customs Stratton has again notified the steamship company that the Chinese must be detained on Gaelic and

not even be allowed to go into the detention shed, pending a final decision in the case by the secretary of the treasury and the commissioner general of immigration. The Sailors' union of the Pacific has en-tered a strong protest against the transfer of these Chinese to Korea. The union contends that the Chinese cannot be transferred to Korea without bringing them ashore to be signed before the United States shipping commissioner, and that the act of bringing them ashore would constitute a violation of the Chinese exclusion act.
