Omaha League Divides Its Season and Will Play Two Championship Tournaments During the Coming Winter.

Two bowling leagues are now on the prospect for the coming winter in Omaha. The latest scheme promulgated by the rollers is to inaugurate a commercial league in addition to the Omaha Bowling league.

It is confidently asserted that far more ease will be experienced in securing a regular, faithful and reliable bowling team from each house than has been the case with the base ball teams. It will require only half as many men and far less equipment.
