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FOLK'S LIFE IN PERIL

St. Louis Circuit Attorney is Threatened with Assassination.

POLICE ON GUARD AGAINST BOOLERS

SIX ALLEGED CRIMINALS ARE STILL FREE

Municipal Malefactor Unable to Secure Heavy Bail Required.

RESORTS TO WRITS OF HABEAS CORPUS

Citizens of City Thoroughly Aroused and Determined to Bring Guilty Parties to Justice—Confessions Come Too Late.

ST. LOUIS SEPT. 10.—Circuit Attorney Joseph W. Folk's life has been threatened.

This information came to Chief of Police Kiley and Chief of Detectives Desmond today. Since that time Detective Joe McGrath has been riding the circuit attorney against possible attack.

The information that threats had been made to kill the circuit attorney came to the police department from a source so reliable that Chief Kiley declared it positively imperative to take every precaution to prevent an attack from an assassin.

Circuit Attorney Folk when told that threats had been made to take his life expressed no surprise. Several times since the season began he has received word of hints have been made to him that he should be careful to protect himself.

"I have been trying to do my duty without malice or illwill and to enforce the laws impartially without fear or favor," said Mr. Folk, "and all the blackguarding and threats of the gang have no terrors for me."

Detective McGrath will remain on duty as guard to the circuit attorney as long as the boodle cases are under investigation.

The police and former Delegate Adolph Meder have been ordered to keep a close watch for suspicious persons in that neighborhood.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 10.—All but six of the nineteen members of the alleged combine of the house of delegates who are under indictment in the case of the former Delegate Adolph Meder, charged on two counts with bribery and one of perjury, are or have been under arrest.

Those who are still at large are Delegate Charles F. Killy and former Delegate John A. Emille Harshbarger, both of whom are under indictment on two counts with bribery and one of perjury; former Delegate Julius Lehmann, charged on two counts with bribery, and already under sentence of two years in the penitentiary for perjury; and former Delegate Adolph Meder, charged on two counts with bribery and one of perjury. The last named is supposed to have been located in Colorado, but the authorities will not say where. It is currently reported that a member of the local detective force has been sent to that state to bring Meder to St. Louis.

Former Delegate William M. Tamblin, who was arrested yesterday in Cleveland, is expected to reach here soon in the custody of an officer from that city.

Leaves Hotel in a Hurry.

It was learned today that Sheridan, who lived at the Hurst hotel, was last seen there Monday. He left hurriedly on that day, when the Murrell confession was made public, and the clerk says he is not expected to return here very soon. It was whereabout of the others is not known to the authorities, who are watching the homes of the missing men and guarding all the avenues of escape. Circuit Attorney Folk is confident he will soon have them all in custody.

The friends of Messrs. Hannagan, Schnetler, Gutke, Helms and Schumacher, who were sent to jail yesterday because of their inability to furnish bonds to the amount of \$45,000 each, are making strenuous efforts to secure their release. If sufficient surety can be secured today, it is stated, the matter will be taken to the supreme court, which body will be asked for writs of habeas corpus. The grounds on which these writs will be asked are not known.

Edward E. Murrell, speaker of the house in the days of the fighting and suburban Krums, was released from custody today after his bond for \$15,000 had been signed by Emil G. Wolchek, a contractor. Only one charge, that of bribery, it is now stated, rests against Mr. Murrell. He has made a confession to Circuit Attorney Folk and will be a state's witness.

"I have made a full statement to Mr. Folk," said the former speaker, "as he left the Four Courts building, 'but I am not at liberty to say anything for publication.'"

Day Passes Quietly.

The day round the four courts, where the municipal boodle investigation is being held, was comparatively quiet, the developments being of less importance than on Monday and Tuesday. Judging from what is expected tomorrow, it is but the calm before the storm.

Delegate Harry A. Faulkner, who was out on bonds aggregating \$40,000, came in and gave additional surety to the amount of \$15,000. His bonds now equal \$55,000, a sum without precedent in the history of the criminal court of Missouri. Delegate J. J. Hannagan was released from jail in bonds of \$45,000 and Delegate E. W. Murrell, who turned state's evidence, was released from custody when friends became surety for the sum of \$15,000, covering the one charge of bribery under which he rests.

Ex-Delegate J. K. Murrell, whose recent confession following his return from Mexico resulted in the issuance of bench warrants against eighteen of his fellow members in the house, was also set at liberty. He furnished a bond in the sum of \$15,000 in the judge's chambers, where he was taken secretly to avoid any possible trouble, the courtroom being crowded with accused delegates and their friends. Un-
