EARLY FROSTS CAUSE SELLING IN CORN

Cables Steady and Government Crop Reports Are Favorable-Provisions Ruled Dull and Sales Were Small.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Speculators in the grain market traded conservatively today, pending the issuance of the government crop report. Weather conditions were sufficient to start liberal selling early in the session, but small receipts of wheat, short stocks of corn and good support in oats kept prices very steady. Contract grades were almost invisible and tended to aid the market. At the close of a somewhat duil trade December wheat was a shade up. September corn &c higher, December corn ic lower, September oats 1461/2 up and December oats a shade higher. Provisions closed 24/c to 71/c down.

Scarcity of spring wheat was the principal steadying factor in the wheat pit Cables were firm, but weather was about all that could be expected. REFUSE TO PAY THE DUTY Army Officers Think Filipino Relica for West Point Museum Should Be Admitted Free.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10 .- Officers of the Eighth United States infantry, who arrived from the Philippines on the transport Buford, are at loggerheads with the local customs officials over the admission, duty free, of a trunk full of trophies from the far east. All the articles were intended as a gift

to the museum of the United States Military academy at West Point, but they will never reach their destination if the Treasury department tries to exact duty from the officers of the Eighth.

Assistant Surveyor of the Port St. John says he cannot pass the articles without consulting higher authority and there the matter rests. Principal among the articles contained

in the trunk are two religious images and the robes in which they were draped. One of these is an ebony figure of the Savier, known in southern Luzon as "The Black Christ." These images were seized by the Eighth infantry at the headquarters of a native religious sect in the town of Pagsangan, province of Laguna, while the regiment was operating in that district. The religious sect was known as the Caldrun enues from the people of the district by imposing on their credulity.

A Filipino ventřiloquist, it is said, would apparently cause the images to speak and order the natives to give their money that the Americans might be driven from the island. The carvings appear to have been made within the last two or three years.
