

ALL READY FOR STUDENTS

University Authorities Anticipate Greatly Increased Attendance.

FOOT BALL OUTLOOK IS DISCOURAGING

A bulletin issued by the university gives the following brief description of the various departments of instruction offered:

Outline of Instruction.

The Graduate School—In the college of literature, science and the arts in the industrial college there are advanced courses of study...

The College of Literature, Science and the Arts—Offers instruction in the liberal arts and literary studies leading to the degree of bachelor of arts.

The Teachers' Course—Is an advanced course for those who intend to prepare by special and professional study for positions of supervision and teaching in departments of higher education.

The Industrial College—Contains the general and special groups of studies in agriculture, agriculture and engineering, leading to the degree of bachelor of science.

The School of Agriculture—Is a secondary school, training students primarily for practical farm life. There are two terms each year and also a summer session for those who cannot spend a longer time at the university.

The School of Mechanical Arts—Secondary and vocational courses in the principles of practical mechanics.

The School of Domestic Science—A training school in the principles of household economics, similar to the school of mechanical arts.

The College of Law—Offers two years of instruction, leading to the degree of bachelor of laws.

The College of Medicine—Offers thorough scientific courses covering four years of instruction, leading to the degree of doctor of medicine.

The School of Fine Arts—Gives instruction in drawing, painting, wood carving, modeling, etching, bristol and the history of art.

The Affiliated School of Music—Provides instruction in every grade of instrumental and vocal music.

The summer session of six weeks is intended to meet the want of teachers and others who wish to pursue college studies but cannot attend the university during its semestral sessions.

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Found Lying in the Yard with Her Clothing in Cinders.

MAY HAVE BEEN WORK OF TRAMPS

Evidences of a Struggle in the House Creates Excitement at Steinauer and the Fulton Bloodhounds Are Sent For.

BEATRICE, Neb., Sept. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—The dead body of Mrs. Fournell was found shortly before noon today lying in the yard of her home, a mile and a half northwest of Steinauer.

Although no one witnessed the horrible affair, the supposition is that Mrs. Fournell's clothing caught fire while she was preparing dinner and she ran out into the yard in order to save herself.

As the woman was alone in the house, however, some think she was murdered by tramps and her body dragged to the barnyard, where her clothing was set on fire. The interior of the house bore evidence of a struggle.

Public sentiment runs high and the excitement is intense. The Fulton bloodhounds of this county have been sent to the scene of the tragedy.

The deceased had been married, but was not living with her husband. She was about 21 years of age and lived with her mother and brother.

BUFFALO DEMOCRATS SPLIT

One-Half the Delegates Leave Hall and Balance Nominate Populist Candidates.

KEARNEY, Neb., Sept. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—The democratic mass convention convened in the court room 2 o'clock this afternoon, with seventeen democrats present.

Colonel Carr was elected chairman and T. J. Scott, secretary. After some speaking Bart Turner of Thornton was proposed as a candidate for the legislature.

This brought on a fight and he was defeated. W. H. Richards moved that an informal ballot be taken, in which sixteen votes were cast, ten for Jordan, six for Turner, one blank.

Then Colonel Carr arose and delivered a democratic speech, denouncing the nomination of a populist and notified the fusionists they could not deliver the democratic vote into the populist camp again, as they had done heretofore.
