

OMAHA WINS ANOTHER PAIR

Saints Drop Sunday's Double-Header Into Papa Bill's Victory Heap. SENSATIONAL FINISH IN SECOND GAME With Score Six to Nothing Against Them in the Fourth, the Omahas Proceeded to Pull Out a Handsome Win.

The Omaha baseball club boosted its own stock mightily Sunday afternoon by taking another double-header from St. Joseph. The capture of the first game was accomplished by the most sensational rally of the season, beginning with the score 6 to 0 against Omaha, and extending through five heart-breaking innings.

There were 6,665 paid admissions at the game and an easy 1,000 extras. This crowd, enthusiastic at all times, went absolutely wild when that terrific rally of six was finally tied in the fifth by Johnny Goding's three-bagger. But the Saints made another in the sixth and again the 6,000 people threw a spasm when Thomas tied the score with a home run in the seventh. Wright's single in the eighth, scoring Carter from second with two outs, was the last straw, and so great was the demonstration and unconfined the hilarity and exuberance of feeling that were a little too strong.

The first game, too, was a grand one, but for different reasons. Omaha won on only four hits, which was all the locals could do to the tall system of St. Joseph. Farvin, meanwhile, the visitors touched Owen for eight, but lost the game on two errors in the fourth by Reynolds and Rube, allowing Stone to score the extra run. Dolan from a single in the second had already tallied on the other two, and in the sixth the other two came on a base on balls, a single and Dolan's beautiful double.

Owen hit Rube in the fourth, and then allowed two successive singles, which scored him. In the fifth the Saints went at it again, bunting a single, Brashear's three-bagger and another single for St. Joseph more runs. That was all, but they were at a killing pace till the end, when Frank wound up by striking out three men in the ninth. Score:

Omaha had Brown in the box and expected to win handily from Maupin, so when old "Ace" Stewart made two lovely errors in the very first inning, allowing one tally, the fans did not worry much. But when the Saints landed on Brown in the third for five hits and a base on balls, scoring five runs, the people were thunderstruck, for their favorite twirler was certainly being punished. It could be said the unexpected errors by Thomas and Wright helped on those five considerably.

They were with three innings gone and the score 6 to 0, and the Rangers completely fagged by Maupin's slow ones. The fourth he gave a base and Dolan followed with a long fly to right-middle that Belden took squarely and then dropped. The ball rolled in under the fence bars and Stone scored. Maupin then filled the bases with two more hits, and everybody said it was the only chance Omaha would get. Brown singled and scored Dolan, but the others died, two out following.

This was the little start needed, for in the fifth the Omahas did work they have never duplicated. Wright flew out, but Brashear's unexplained error let Stone to first. Dolan singled, and "Cap" Stewart drove out a double, scoring Stone and Dolan. Then Thomas flew out, and it looked as if they were all. It wasn't. Goding put a three-bagger to middle field, and followed Stewart right at the diamond, scoring on Garvin's error in dropping the ball at home plate.

Trouble Getting Good. The tally was tied, and for the first time this year's heat went out in the first. The sixth renewed the difficulties, as the Saints continued their lambasting of Brown, scoring another run. When the locals got to Mr. Hahn, Genins started out with a double to wipe out the lead again, but no one helped him on, and the seventh came on. It was growing dark, and people feared the umpire might stop the game. He didn't, and St. Joseph was shut out in the seventh. In Omaha's half Dolan and Stewart went out in order, and hope was at a low ebb when Thomas came to bat. All he did was to pole out a home run to the dark green sign.

Again the score was tied, and the strain was something fierce. But Brown was with the stuff at last. Aided by a team that was by this time fielding perfectly, he let only three men onto the base in the eighth, and as many in the ninth. Brown and Genins were first up in the eighth and both went out. Under this dark cloud Carter teased a gift, and then stole second. He never did a more timely piece of pilfering than his Wright error, clearing to right, and then ran as a 7 to 6.

Today is ladies' day, and the fans, bolstered by five straight victories, expect more fine business. This is the last appearance of the Saints. Peoria comes next. Score:
