mittee Meets and Practically

BERLIN. Sept. 22.—Henry J. Furber, jr., the Olympian games delegate to Germany, and Baron Pierre de Couberlin, chairman of the international Olympian games committee, the permanent body that selects the country in which the successive contests take place, conferred at Munster, Alsace, Friday and Saturday.

They decided, first, that the rules of the recognized athietic organization of the United States, the Amateur Athietic union, shall govern the Chicago games, in the case of a conflict between the rules of different countries; second, if agreeable to the king of the Belgiams, who has promised to preside, that the athletic convention which was to be held in Brussels next spring, for the development of an international code of athletic rules, will be postponed until after the games in 1964 at Chicago, because if the congress was unable to agree it would create difficulty for the Chicago management.
