CHICAGO, Sept. 29.-Weakness was again prevalent on the Board of Trade today and trading on the whole rather light. December wheat closed %c lower, December corn a shade lower, oats \47%c lower. January pork closed 121/20 lower, lard 71/20 lower and ribs 15c lower. Heavy receipts, with an unusually large

supply of contract wheat, together with weak cables, large world's shipments and a large increase in the visible supply, all a large increase in the visible supply, all conspired against strong prices, and prices consequently were lower. There was consequently were lower. There was considerable selling of December by commission houses, but offerings were well absorbed. Soptember closed at Mike. December opened 142 clower at 69 cc to 60 c. On commission house selling there was a decline to 684 205 cc, around which figure the market held steady. The close was to lower at 63 cc. The increase on ocean passage for the week amounted to 2,52,000 bu. and visible supply showed an increase of 2,310,000 bu. compared with an increase last year of 2,673,000 bu. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 37,000 bu. Primary receipts were 1,971,000 bu. Minneapolis and Duisth reported receipts of 1,190 cars, which, with local receipts of 251 cars, 15 of contract grade, made total receipts for the three points of 1,51 cars, against 1,572 last week and 1,552 a year ago.

Corn was fairly steady for distant months, but dull and weak for the nearby deliveries. There was considerable realizing by longs early, but offerings were well taken by local traders. Favorable weather, with commission house selling, were weakening factors. December opened 4c lower at 45%,045%c, selling down to 454c. Toward the close the market became firmer and final figures were lower at 45%c. Local receipts were 414 cars, with 80 of contract grade.
