TALKS OF THE PHILIPPINES

Consul General Williams Makes His Initial Bow to Nebraska Audience.

BLAIR, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—Introduced to his first Nebraska audience tonight at the opera house, Consul General O. P. Williams, who was at Singapore in his official position at the time of the breaking out of the Spanish-American war, spoke briefly upon the national issues of the day, and compared the area, population and industrial capabilities of the Philippines to show his hearers the vast resources of these new possessions. His remarks upon the tin industry and the effects of the Dingley and McKinley tariff bills, were along the line of a defense of the republican administration. He paid a glowing tribute to the late President McKinley and his administration. Mr. Williams held the attention of his audience here tonight by his evident knowledge of the subject he was handling and his fluency as an orator, as was evidenced by the frequent applause with which he was greeted.

He leaves Blair on the early train tomorrow morning for Oakland, where he speaks in the evening.

B. W. Reynolds of Fremont, republican candidate for next senator in the Tenth district, was in Blair and vicinity today making a canvass among the republican voters and building up his senatorial fences in a general way. He remained over tonight and attended the meeting addressed by Consul General Williams.

BURKETT PLEASURES ORD PEOPLE

Congressman from First District Takes Up the Paramount Issues of Democracy.

ORD, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—Congressman E. J. Burkett spoke here tonight to a large audience. Many farmers drove for miles to hear him. Before introducing the speaker Dr. Brink, chairman of the county committee, called on the Ord Mandolin club, which rendered several choice selections. The crowd present was much pleased with the witty and logical manner of Mr. Burkett, and it is thought that the republican cause was greatly strengthened in this vicinity by his speech. His manner of taking up the various paramount issues of the democratic party was most amusing. He explained that trust bugaboo, and while admitting that trusts had grown under republican rule, showed that everything else had grown also, and that under democratic rule nothing ever prospered.

ROBBERS MAKE GOOD WAGES

Indications that Fruits of Train Holdup Exceed Thirty Thousand Dollars.

MICKIE ADDRESSES COLLEGE STUDENTS

State Labor Commissioner Discovers Many Evasions of the Child Labor Law in Omaha and South Omaha.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Several officers to whom the express company officials confided detailed information about the recent holdup here say that the amount secured by the robbers was between \$30,000 and \$40,000. The express officials, however, say all that is left. Local bankers think that the amount of money secured was of considerable proportions, as there has been a great deal of coin and currency going to the northwest in recent weeks to help save crops.

Superintendent Bignell said this afternoon that he felt confident the robbers would be caught. The clues have been intangible and many, but the hunt has been narrowing down steadily.

Orders were issued at police headquarters today to bring in certain men and these will be called as soon as they can be found and the sweatbox applied.

Lincoln police officers promise developments of some importance in the Burlington train robbery within the next twenty-four hours.

What these are they will not disclose, but it is thought arrests are contemplated in connection with the theft of three horses near the town of Raymond, which were seen on a country road near that town. Arrests, if there be any, will be in Lincoln.

RAINS SPOIL GRAIN AND HAY

Water Stands in Pools Around Stacks in the Lowlands and Do Much Damage.

SCHUYLER, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—From Saturday morning until the middle of Sunday afternoon the almost incessant, and at times very fast rain, resulted in a total precipitation of 2 1/2 inches. It was a notably excessive rain for the season of the year and makes a much greater showing because of the ground having been thoroughly wet by rains of but a few days before. There is more water standing on the bottoms than has been seen at any time during the entire year, regardless of its having been a year of unusual wet weather conditions. There are many places where twenty to 100 acres are submerged, and dozens of haystacks are standing in six inches to two feet of water, which will result in great loss, as the water spoils the hay to a height in stacks above the water that stands around them. There are numerous stacks of grain yet not threshed, and many of the stacks have taken water to such extent that much of the grain will be injured.

FREMONT, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The heavy rainfall of the last two days, amounting to nearly two inches, will prevent any work being done in the beet fields for a few days. In many fields the water stands above the rows. The sugar content of the beets will not be reduced and the only injury will be that caused by delay.

HARVARD, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Another rain of about one inch of water has fallen, such retarding seeding for some days. It will require two weeks of good weather to complete winter wheat seeding.

LEIGH, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The hardest autumn rain of the season fell here Saturday and Sunday. It began raining Saturday morning and continued at intervals until Sunday night. Polly three inches of water fell.

WEST POINT, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—A very cold and disagreeable rain fell for twenty-four hours yesterday. About two inches of water fell.

Boys Run Away.

OGALALLA, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Four boys of the high school, youngsters 16 to 18 years old, ran away Friday night. This morning a letter was received from one of the boys at Denver. He said they were going to Texas. They are all sons of prominent citizens here.

becoming sponsor for his good behavior or for the return of his parole. His parole occurred on the 9th inst. He had served three years and two months of his term and the governor thought that he has been pretty effectively punished, not by the length of his service, but by the fact that he was severely disciplined before he was released from the doors of the jail, took the prisoner therefrom and with the aid of a veterinary surgeon subjected him to an operation which has since been known as the "falls city method" of dealing with rape cases. He is at work in the Boyd hotel kitchen now.

Charges Husband with Theft.

Mrs. Jens F. Steffenson caused the arrest today of her husband on the charge of stealing \$1,000 from her. Six months ago Mrs. Steffenson was a widow and lived at Atlantic, Ia. When her first husband died he left her a considerable sum of money, the amount of which she had \$1,000 left. They came to Lincoln and Steffenson went to work in a planing mill. Three weeks ago he suddenly left home. Soon afterward she missed her money. She says he took it. He says he didn't, but admits that he knew his wife had it.

Mistake May Be Costly.

Just because Secretary Lindley of the Security Mutual Insurance company, a local organization, forgot himself for a moment, his company may have to pay the heirs of George Klutsch \$5,000. When Klutsch died in July of last year a policy for that amount was found among his effects, together with two receipts showing ostensibly that he had paid the premiums in advance up until November 1901. The company insists that he had paid but one premium, but that by mistake two receipts were issued. The company's refusal to give its contention by admissions of Klutsch and by the fact that he had taken out a policy in substitution, which has already been paid his heirs. The estate claims that he paid once the receipt the company is escaped from setting up that it was a mistake on an error.

Savage Going to Mexico.

Governor Savage and members of his staff are planning a junket to Mexico to take place in the latter part of November and December. Members of the staff have been requested by the governor to indicate their intention of making such a trip and to designate the number of women who will accompany them. Not all of those invited have accepted.

Capital City Notes.

Thomas B. Frazier, prohibition candidate for congress in the First congressional district, has filed a certificate showing that he has no other business, either in money or property of any kind, value or amount of its indebtedness was limited to \$187,000. September 23 it again increased the amount of its capital stock to \$500,000, its shares to \$100 each and its possible indebtedness to two-thirds of the amount of its capital stock.

Insane Man Disappears.

WARNO, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—Fred Shieffeline, an old resident of Green precinct, this county, was brought to Warso this afternoon to be examined by the insane board. The parties who came up with him left him with an old friend of his, living west of the courthouse, while they went to see the proper authorities. Mr. Shieffeline was quite restless and desired to walk out doors. He suddenly disappeared and notwithstanding a diligent search was made, he cannot be found. He was a very religious man and his mania was along that line.

STEAL ROBE FROM WRONG MAN

Men Take Robe from Sheriff and Are Trapped on Charge of Stealing Cattle.

OGALALLA, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Two strangers rode into town Friday evening and put their horses in the livery barn. The next morning they paid the bill and rode away. Shortly after they had gone the proprietor of the livery barn, W. Harrington, who is also sheriff of the county, discovered that a buggy robe was missing. Supposing that the two strangers had stolen the robe he immediately went in pursuit and overhauled them a few miles south of town. Sheriff Harrington wanted these parties might be wanted elsewhere and upon searching found on one of them a letter from Sheridan, Wyo., which connected them with some cattle rustling near Sheridan. He wired the sheriff at Sheridan, who replied to hold the two men, that they were cattle thieves and that he would come after them. Their names are Osa Fries and William Benson. They agree to return without requisition papers.

Relatives Give Up Search.

FREMONT, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The relatives of Ernest Hussman, the man who disappeared under suspicious circumstances from Leavitt, have given up their search for him. They are convinced that he has met with foul play and that his body was either burned up in the lime kiln or removed to some distance from Leavitt.

Heavy Rain at Shelton.

SHELTON, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—A heavy rain has fallen here all day, commencing early this afternoon. Full three inches of water have fallen and the ditches are all full again. There are yet a number of fields of small grain in shock and this will be a total loss to the owners, as much of it has grown.

Business Change at Wymore.

WYMORE, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—E. W. Fenton of this city has purchased a half interest in the Madson & Asher steam laundry. Mr. Asher retires from the firm and will locate at Norfolk, Neb.

Appointed Deputy Game Warden.

FREMONT, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—W. H. Turner of Crab Orchard has been appointed deputy game warden for Johnson county.

DROPS DEAD IN THE STREET

Tragic End of One of Most Prominent Citizens of Schuyler.

FOUND IN SHALLOW POOL OF WATER

First Thought to Have Been Drowned, but More Thorough Examination Shows It to Have Been Heart Failure.

SCHUYLER, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—Chris Kroeger, aged 44, one of Schuyler's foremost citizens, was found dead in a pool of water not far from his home in the south part of the city this afternoon. He was returning from an errand uptown, and only a minute or two before his dead body was discovered by two passers-by, had been conversing with a friend a short distance away. He had fallen from the sidewalk into a shallow pool left by the rain. The men who found him attempted to resuscitate him, but were unsuccessful. Within a few moments four doctors were at work on the body, without avail. There was no evidence of drowning, and the doctors say he was probably dead before he struck the water, heart failure being assigned as the cause. Deceased was unmarried, a member of the Odd Fellows and Knights of Pythias. He was sheriff of Fillmore county from 1882 to 1885.

CAPTURE ONE OF BURGLARS

Another One Pursued by Posse, but Gets into Swamp and Escapes.

WEST POINT, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The saloon of Mrs. Valentine Gelst was entered by burglars early yesterday morning and a review belonging to the bartender and \$35 in money taken. Entrance was effected by the rear window. The robbery was discovered a few minutes after its occurrence and a posse was immediately organized and started in pursuit. Tracks led to the Crowell gang of outlaws, who have been recently eradicated since the killing of Herman Zahn. The captured man will have his preliminary hearing this afternoon.

Was an Old Settler in Dodge.

FREMONT, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Hon. J. R. Cantlin of Blair, whose death was announced in today's Bee, was one of the early settlers of this county, removing to Blair about two years ago. He was one of the organizers of the old grange movement and was for several years at the head of the state grange. When the populist movement started in 1890 he left the republican party and identified himself with the populists. He was a very successful farmer and stock raiser and on account of his connection with the State Agricultural society had a large acquaintance throughout the state.

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Candidate for Commissioner.

TECUMSEH, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Some of the friends of Mike Curtin of Sterling precinct are circulating a petition and will place his name on the county ticket as candidate for commissioner. Mr. Curtin is a democrat and wanted the office when the fusion forces met, but according to the state he was left out in the cold. He will get a good vote from the democratic end of the fusion gang, for a populist is the candidate on the fusion ticket.

Kinkaid is Well Pleased.

SHELTON, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Judge M. P. Kinkaid, candidate for congress, spent the day making acquaintances and friends among the people and voters of this end of Buffalo county. He has been away from home three weeks looking after his chances of election, and expresses himself highly pleased with the prospects. This part of Nebraska has such an abundance of work that no political meetings have been held this fall.

Sappy County Republican Nominees.

PAPILLION, Neb., Oct. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—The republican delegates from the various precincts of Sappy county met at the court house in convention this afternoon. The following candidates were nominated: County attorney, James Hassett; Papillion representative, Dr. A. G. Hamilton of Springfield; commissioner of Third commissioners' district, William Siekkotter of Greta.

Kearney is Having a Revival.

KEARNEY, Neb., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Dr. Smiley, the evangelist, and Prof. McKinsey, the singer, closed the first week of their series of evangelistic meetings under the auspices of united Kearney churches. They have awakened a great revivalistic interest and the Sunday meetings were a great event in the religious life of the city. The meetings will be continued the present week.

Appointed Deputy Game Warden.
