BLAIR, Neb., Oct. 13 .- (Special Telegram.)-Introduced to his first Nebraska audience tonight at the opera house, Consul General O. F. Williams, who was at Singapore in his official position at the time of the breaking out of the Spanisn-American war, spoke briefly upon the national issues of the day, and compared the area, population and industrial capabilities of the Philippines to show his hearers the vast resources of these new possessions. His remarks upon the tin industry and the effects of the Dingley and McKinley tariff bills, were along the line of a defense of the republican administration. He paid a glowing tribute to the late President McKinley and his administration. 




