## CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Comptreller is Requested to Certify Capital Avenue Market Appropriation.

NO MORE FUNDS FOR FIRE DEPARTMENT

Communication from Fire and Police Board Goes to Committee on Judiciary with Scant Consideration.

Having found an available balance of a little more than \$15,000 in the general fund the city council last evening proceeded to clinch its appropriation for the proposed Capitol avenue market house by instructing the comptroller to certify the sum of \$15,800 to the appropriation. The exact amount of the balance in the general fund as shown by the financial statement of the comptroller was \$15,514.78, and hence there is now available of that amount only \$514.78 wherewith to meet a number of current expense bills which have been laid over at several previous meetings for lack of funds, or to make any appropriation to augment the fire department fund, which is totally insufficient to carry the necessary expenses of the department to the end of the year. The resolution instructing the comptroller as stated was introduced by Councilman Hascall and was as follows:

Whereas, by concurrent resolution number 1162 passed over the veto of the mayor June 1, 1962, the sum of \$15.000 was appropriated and set aside out of the general fund for the erection of a market house.
