ORATORY IN THE COUNCIL.

Property Owners Protest on Moving Frame Building into Fire Limits.

LEONARD EVERETT SAYS IT IS SPITE WORK

Keeline heirs protest on paving East Pierce Street and serve notice they will not pay for the same.

The permission granted by the city council to Leonard Everett to move a two-story frame building onto Twelfth street near Broadway after the fire limits had been extended by ordinance to include this portion of the city, has aroused a strong protest from owners of property in that locality and they made themselves heard at the meeting of the city council last night.

The protesting property owners were willing, however, that Mr. Everett be permitted to move the building, which he proposes converting into a hotel, provided he would agree to veneer it with brick. Mr. Everett protested strongly against such requirement being placed upon him, and in an impassioned speech accused members of the city council of venting their personal spite against him in this matter. He called attention to the fact that another citizen had been permitted to move a frame building within the fire limits without any question, but when it came to the matter of his moving such a building "his personal enemies in the council worked off their private grudges against him" by extending the fire limits for the sole purpose of placing a stumbling block in his way.

Protest on Paving.

Mrs. Sophie Keeline and heirs of George Keeline filed a formal protest against the paving, curbing, grading and sewerage of East Pierce street in front of their property and notifying the council that they would refuse to pay the assessment for such improvement. In their protest they allege that the thoroughfare is a state road and was never dedicated to the public and that their holdings are held for agricultural purposes only and not subject to municipal taxation and that same had been so decided by the district court.

Public School Apportionment.

County Auditor Innes made the semi-annual apportionment of the school fund yesterday and \$8,773.05 was accordingly distributed among the several school districts of the county. The general tax levy of 1 mill for school purposes for the six months realized \$5,281.37, and to this was added the interest on school fund loans for the six months, amounting to \$2,295.58, an dthe fines collected in the district and superior courts, amounting to \$1,196. According to the report of the county superintendent there are 15,951 children of school age in Pottawattamie county, and on this basis the apportionment amounted to 55 cents a head. The independent school district of Council Bluffs, with 6,704 children of school age, received as its proportion of the apportionment \$3,687.28.

Formulate New Insurance Policy.

Attorney General Mullin and State Auditor Merriam today prepared a new standard uniform policy of fire insurance to conform to the Iowa laws and to take the place of the present uniform policy in use by the Iowa companies. This action was taken as the result of the appeal to the governor by Burlington business men to have the companies remove an objectionable clause in their present policies.

Sudden Death of Doctor.

Dr. Scott was found in a chair dead this morning. The exact cause of his death is unknown. He was about 35 years old and had traveled extensively selling medicines. He has a son, Ed Scott, with whom he was living at the time. His wife lives in Keokuk. Dr. Scott came to Des Moines some three months ago from Kansas City. He had been ill two or three weeks, and it is probable that his death came as the natural result of this illness, the exact nature of which was not well understood.
