NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Trading in the stock market today was in light volume, very narrow and devoid of any noteworthy feature. The formal settlement of the coal strike excited little interest. There was just a bare suggestion of activity at the opening, but this was almost altogether due to moderate buying for account of the western speculative contingent. The market soon became very dull and save for a few apasmodic rallies continued so to the end. Missouri Pacific's unfavorable showing for August caused heavy selling, with an extreme decline of 2 points. Much of the selling came from one of the pools that had been prominent in the stock.
