Promise of Bad Weather Helps to Maintain Wheat Prices.

ALARMED CORN SHORTS COVER FREELY

Dats and Provisions Both Remain Dull. Though Values Increase Slightly During a Day of Small Sales.

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—A good cash and export demand, together with prospects of unfavorable weather, caused a firm tone to wheat today and December closed to higher. December corn was 1½c higher, while oats were unchanged. January provisions closed from 2½555 to 15c higher. The wheat market in Liverpool showed considerable strength today in face of the weakness here yesterday, and this fact, together with predictions of ratus in the northwest, resulted in higher prices here. Strength in corn was also a supporting factor. A report that a large volume of wheat was under contract at Duluth to come to Chicago had a depressing influence on Depember, which was relatively weaker than May. This fact, together with the predictions for unfavorable weather, caused a strong feeling in the pit and shorts took alarm and began covering freely, and one or two longs added to their lines. Offerings, however, were light and the market held strong. December closed 1%c higher at 51%251%c, after selling between 50%c and 51%c. Local receipts were 264 cars, with 56 of contract grade.

Outs were dull and featureless and prices fluctuated within a narrow range. May closed a shade higher, with December unchanged, at 31%c, the latter ranging between 31%c and 31%c. Local receipts were 243 cars.
