FORFEIT PAVING CONTRACT

Council Takes First Step in Abrogat-

ing Contract on Harrison Street.

At the meeting of the city council last night City Solicitor Snyder was instructed at Atlantic. Wednesday afternoon he is to draft a resolution declaring the contract of E. A. Wickham for the paving evening at raie. George M. Daniels arrived in this city about two weeks ago and secured permission to speak in some of the churches. He had a lecture to deliver. He represented himself to be a former brigand in Asia Minor now reformed and he had a thrilling tale to tell of life in Turkey. His lecture, which was delivered in your or five of the Des Moines churches, was pronounced excellent. He had striking costumes and is a fluent talker. He had papers showing that he had received an education at a Presbyterian mission in Persia and later had spoken in leading churches in England and America. He depended on voluntary contributions at his lectures and charged no fee of admission. How much he received in Des Moines is not known, but he said he was collecting money for the establishment of a mission in Khurdistan. Saturday Daniels left Dee Moines and appeared in Marshalltown, where he had made arrangements to speak in two of the churches. The church people had been notified and he was refused the right to enter the pulpits. This is the first time the matter has overtaken Mr. Daniels. He had previously spoken in Burlington and Ottumwa and was doing a thriving business.


