ASK FOR RIGHT TO APPEAL

Osgood Fraction in Colorado Fuel and Iron Litigation Refuses to Abide by Decision.

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 29.—A. M. Stevenson and D. C. Beaman, representing the Osgood fraction in the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, have left Denver for St. Paul, where, it is said, they will tomorrow morning present to Judge W. D. Sanborn of the United States circuit court of appeals a petition for permission to take an appeal from the order entered by Judge Caldwell, who, sitting as United States district judge in Denver, appointed a master in chancery to conduct the election of directors of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company and ordered the election to be held December 1.

ROOSEVELT ON HIS OFFICE

Writes Article Setting Forth His Views on Presidents and Their Duties.

WORK WELL DONE IS GREATEST REWARD

Country Has Had Weak and Unwise Heads, but Never One Whose Character Could Be Impugned by Anyone.

BOSTON, Oct. 29.—In an article in the Bostonian which will appear in the issue of the 31st inst., Theodore Roosevelt gives his ideas of the duties and responsibilities of the president of the United States. He writes the article in the issue of the 31st inst. of the Bostonian, and he was governor of New York, and previous to his nomination for vice president. In it Mr. Roosevelt says: The president of the United States occupies a position of peculiar importance. In the whole world there is no other ruler, certainly no other ruler under free institutions, whose power compares with his. Of course the enormous personal factor of the incumbent himself must be considered entirely apart from the power of the office itself, but this is merely another way of stating that to give a good administration demands the most anxious thought no less than the most powerful powers of mind. There is every reason why the president should be held to a sharp account for what he does and for what he leaves undone. It is not his duty to do what he likes, but if we fail to treat with proper respect the man who, in the highest office of our country, is entrusted with the duty of representing the United States to the world, we have a precedent which has acted weakly or unwisely in particular crises, but we have a precedent which has acted with personal integrity there was so much as a shadow of suspicion. All appointments and policies which are normally routine and unimportant may suddenly become of absolutely vital consequence. Altogether there are few harder tasks than that of filling the office of president of the United States. But if the man at the close of his term is able to feel that he has done his duty well, he has the satisfaction of feeling that he has performed the greatest work of his life, and that the mere performance of it is itself the greatest of all rewards.

SMUGGLER ON REVENUE BOAT

Cool Nerve of Chinaman in Selecting Government Vessel to Carry Out Illegal Practice.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 29.—Eighty pounds of opium, which a Chinese stevedore on the coast survey steamer Gedyne, will be charged with attempting to smuggle from Victoria to Seattle, was seized aboard the cutter by customs inspectors today. Eight parcels, worth in the aggregate \$1,024, were found in the steward's department. Gong Gee, the steward, is in the county jail awaiting trial for attempting to smuggle the opium. He was indicted by the grand jury of the county on the same charge. A strange feature is the smuggler's cool nerve in selecting a government vessel for a vehicle with which to carry on his illegal practice. Secretary Shaw's young son, a guest on the Gedyne, was induced by some representative of the Celestial, to say that Gong Gee wanted his effects thrown overboard. This gave the officer the clue to search for the opium.

MANY NAMED MAN JAILED

St. Louis Forger Sentenced for Shooting at Pursuing Patrolman.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 29.—William Smith, the man with many aliases, who was arrested on Saturday after an exciting chase, was today sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. He pleaded guilty to the charge of assault with intent to kill. The original charge was forgery, but he was shot at the police who were pursuing him and the more serious charge was substituted.
