FAKE FOOT RACERS IN HAND

Answer Criminal Charge.

Further Pursuit.

SHERIFF'S RACE WITH COLORADO JUSTICE

After making a hard fight to prevent their extradition, Leon Lozier and Ed Moore, under indictment on a charge of conspiring to defraud Charles Gregory and William Barker of this city out of \$5,000 on an alleged fake foot race in Webb City. arrived in Council Bluffs yesterday from Denver, Colo., in the custody of Sheriff Cousins, and were at once placed in the county fall. Later in the day Moore secured his release on a \$2,000 bond furnished by his slater, Miss Anna Moore, Daniel Carrigg and Attorney A. W. Ask-

Lozier and Moore resorted to every means possible to avoid extradition and Sheriff Cousins only succeeded in getting them away from Denver a few minutes ahead of officers armed with habeas corpus papers. The train had barely cleared the platform before the officers reached the depot with the papers to serve on Sheriff Cousins. Lozier and Moore, immediately on their arrest in Denver at the instigation of the authorities here, secured the services of attorneys, one of whom was the county attorney of Arapahoe county, and when Sheriff Cousins reached there with the requisition papers for the two men he found it necessary to also employ counsel. The arrival of Mr. Barker in Denver with a bench warrant in answer to a telegram from Sheriff Cousins helped matters, and at the hearing before
