"I heard Scanlon go into the doctor's private office and I heard him and the doctor talking.

There was no quarrel or loud words, however, until Dr. Kimberlin cried out: 'Oh, don't John!'

The first person to enter the room was Dr. Kimberlin's son, who is proprietor of a drug store situated on the ground floor of the building.

Both men lay on the floor covered with blood and dead.

Scanlon had been receiving treatment from Dr. Kimberlin for about two weeks.

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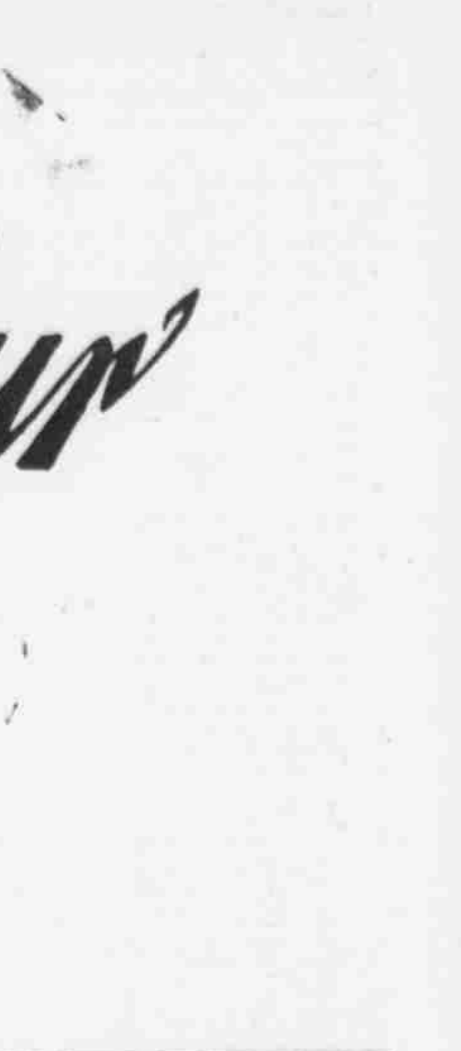
