DECEMBER CORN BUYING BRINGS RISE

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—Trading in wheat on the Board of Trade today was dull. Strength in corn and covering by shorts caused a firm tone late in the session and Docember closed 14c higher and oats 4c higher. Jacomber corn closed 14c higher and oats 4c higher. January provisions closed from 5c lower to a shade higher.

Wheat ruled dull and although the close was higher, the market on the whole was inclined to weakness.
