he said, but he had left the station without doing so. "I advised the children not to leave home," he said, "and I told them they would want to come back. They told me their father said they could go, and, of course, it was none of my business. My wife or Mrs. Johnson had told me before that the children were going to St. Louis. Two of the girls were to live with Mrs. H. H. Clarke, one with a friend of Mrs. Clarke and the other with Mrs. Johnson's sister. The women arranged for their
