"No one goes out of this room until he is frisked," he shouted, and at the point of the gun the entire crowd was compelled to give up all the money they had. Rogers had kept about \$350 and was re-Heved of this. Rogers swore out a warrant for the arrest of the Scollards and they are now out under \$500 bonds.

EDITOR INSTANTLY KILLED

Nelson Hersch of the New York World Meets with a Fatal Accident.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 .- Nelson Hersch. editor of the Sunday edition of the New York World, was instantly killed near his home at West Brighton, Staten Island, today, by being thrown from a buggy. He fell on his head, breaking his arm and fracturing his skull.

Mr. Hersch was driving home before day light and his vehicle ran into a ditch which he could not see. The body was taken to his residence. Mr. Hersch was 41 years old, a native of Rock Island, and a graduate of Yale.

He was connected with the Davenport, Ia., Gazette, and on the staff of the New York Commercial Advertiser for several years. Two years ago he became editor of the Sunday World. He leaves a widow and

Nelson Hersch, whose death in New York s reported in the press dispatches, as the result of an accident on Staten Island, was a former resident of Omaha. He was city editor of the Omaha Herald under Dr. Miller from 1885 to 1888, and went from here to the St. Louis Globe-Democrat. From St. Louis he went to New York with the Herald. While employed on that paper he worked up the Ludlow street jail scandal. which resulted in a municipal investigation. He had himself incarcarated in the Ludiow street jail on the charge of forgery and remained there for three or four months securing data for the articles which he afterward published. At the time of his death he was Sunday editor of the New York World. He was a brother-in-law of D. Risley of this city.

STUDENT LEAVES NO CLUE Engages Passage for America Antwerp, but the Ship Sails Without Him.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 .- Consular and detective agencies of Europe are endeavoring to discover the whereabouts of Frederick C. Johnson, son of Colonel Edmond Johnson, a wealthy ciziten of Vineland, N. J., who disappeared three months ago.

Johnson is a nephew of Princess Agnes Salm-Salm of Bonn, Prussia, who is well known in Chicago, where her sister, Mrs. I. H. Rhea, resides. He was a student at the University of Pennsylvania and after finishing his studies there had taken a course at the Darmstadt university.

On September 1 he started from Bonn for Vineland. That was the last his relatives ever saw of him. Upon receiving no news of his arrival in the United States the princess made inquiries of the steamship company and learned that he had engaged passage at Antwerp, but that the steamship sailed without him. TALKS OF WORK OF THE AGITATORS

Stirring Up Trouble and Accomplishing Nothing, Because if They

Kill a King Someone

Takes His Place. BRUSSELS, Nov. 20 .- King Leopold made a somewhat striking reply today to a deputation from the chamber, headed by the president, who presented his majesty with an address of congratulation on his escape Saturday from the anarchist's bullet.

After thanking the deputies the king continued:

tinued:

The times are very troubled. Agitators are constantly stirring up their fellows to disturb that order which is the guaranty of public liberties.

Without order only license remains, which leads inevitably to despotism. These agitators find in their path, firstly, the heads of states. If they fail to reach them they attack their wives, as in the case of the horrible drama at Geneva.

Their blows are also aimed at ministers, as in the case of Senor Canovas, and they also blow up the houses of private individuals. They want to intimidate. But they will not succeed. Even if they struck down the head of the state it would make no difference, as he would soon be replaced.

In addition to revolver shots they employ pen, which can write what calumnie they please.

I am nearing the end of my life. I do not know how long I shall live, how long they will let me live, but I can assure you that the rest of my existence will be devoted within the limits of my constitutional powers to the good of my country and to the protection of its liberties.
