Disposition Shown to Avoid Prolonged Hearing of Causes.

SURANTON, Pa., Nov. 21.—The miners and mine owners have agreed to attempt to adjust their differences without the aid of the strike commission.

Wish to Hurry End

According to the suggestion just made by counsel that an interval of time be allowed for the preparation of the documentary evidence, and for a possible agreement to be reached, the commission would forward the work of this commission to the commission, and that an effort will be made by the parties to reach an agreement on nearly all, if not all, the matters now in controversy and that they will adopt the suggestion heretofore made by the commission to counsel on both sides that we sit here in the interval of time to be granted may be availed of with this end in view.

Eventual adjournment was taken at 12:45 until tomorrow, when it is believed the suggestion for a week or ten days' adjournment will be adopted.

During the entire proceedings the matter of a settlement was not spoken of, except in the chairman's announcement.
