

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Substitute for City Engineer Rosewater's Original Franchise is Introduced.

One Provision Suggested by the First Ward Councilman, However, is Not Incorporated in the New Ordinance.

An otherwise dull and uninteresting meeting of the city council last evening was enlivened by the reappearance of the ordinance to grant Andrew Rosewater rights in the use of streets of the city for the distribution of electricity, and discussion as to the temporary disposition of the ordinance.

The document submitted last evening is the substitute for the original ordinance, and into it have been incorporated all of the amendments suggested by Councilman Hascall, except the one which Mr. Rosewater has refused from the first to accept, as was stated by him at the general meeting of Monday afternoon.

Mr. Zimman moved to amend Mr. Hascall's motion in such manner as to lay the ordinance over under the rules. The members addressed themselves to the question of proper procedure, but diverged frequently from that line of argument to contemplate other phases of the question.

Mr. Hascall received the remarks of Mr. Zimman and others who favored Mr. Zimman's motion as implying that it was his purpose or the purpose of the committee to get possession of the document for the purpose of delaying it and defeating it in that way.

By motion it was provided that the substitute ordinance presented last evening and the amendments proposed by Councilman Hascall shall be printed in the official papers for the remainder of this week and that the Commercial club, the business men of the city and the public generally are invited to attend the meeting of next Monday evening in the council chamber and to discuss the ordinance and proposed amendments.
