## KROPP BITTERLY CRITICISED

Death Does Not Exempt Gun Maker from Socialist Attacks.

CHARGES BEFORE MADE ARE REITERATED

Attention is called to Pension System in Vogue in Gun Works and Injustice with Which Employees Are Treated.

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—The socialist organ, Vorwarts, in a page and a half today, deals with what it calls the "hypocrisy of idealizing Herr Krupp as a benevolent genius."

The paper does not touch on the immediate charges which it brought against the deceased, but analyzes the pension system of the Krupp firm, which, it says, is a "species of refined swindling."

The paper adds: "The enormous so-called benevolent funds have been built up by compulsory contributions from the employees, who could be arbitrarily deprived of participation in the advantages. They are required to contribute 2 1/2 per cent. of their wages for twenty years before they are eligible to a pension upon disability."

"In the meantime if an employe is discharged, or resigns he loses all he has contributed, often exceeding \$50. Thus employes are morally and economically terrorized and must in humility accept every petty regulation of the firm's officials, or lose 2 1/2 per cent. of what they have earned in the service of the firm."

"This terrorism is applied to political opinions where they become known. The number of men leaving or discharged during the past three years averaged 7,000 or 8,000 yearly. The employes found the system so unsatisfactory that five great meetings were held this year for the purpose of seeking legal redress."

The Vorwarts cites an instance of a labor representative on the advisory committee of the benevolent pension fund who mildly criticized the management and who several days later, having in the meantime paid his annual dues, was dismissed.

The paper also quotes the German budget committee proceedings as showing that the Krupp works have been charging the navy \$100 per ton above what the United States pays for nickel-steel plates, amounting yearly to \$750,000 for Herr Krupp and his works.

The attacks on Herr Krupp and the intense sensation which they have created have caused a furious political discussion, the socialists calling attention to the degenerating influence of great wealth and the conservatives pointing out "the desperate character of the socialist attack upon the existing order of society."

## FIX HIGHER FREIGHT RATES

Traffic Officials Formally Arrange Advances For Next Month.

### GRAIN AND FLOUR TWO AND HALF CENTS

Provisions Increase Nickel, Coal, Iron Cement and Other Commodities Go Up from Ten to Thirty-Five Per Cent.

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—General traffic officials of the Central freight association met here today and formally decided the advance in freight rates ordered at the joint meeting of the lines and Central Freight association last week.

The new rates will go into effect on December 8.

The advance on grain and flour rates will be 2 1/2 cents per 100 pounds and 5 cents on provisions.

Rates on coal, iron, cement and other special commodities will go up from 10 to 35 per cent.

No changes have been made in class rates, but the classification has been revised so as to make the class rates on many articles considerably higher.

### RAILROADS MAKE MUCH MONEY

Net Earnings Grow by More Than Fifty Million Dollars.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—The preliminary report of the Interstate Commerce commission on the income of railways for the year ended June 30 last, contains returns of companies operating 195,900 miles or line.

The passenger earnings were \$472,429,145 and the freight earnings \$1,200,854,603. Gross earnings amounted to \$1,711,745,200, or \$8.726 per mile, and operating expenses \$1,109,137,405 or \$5.645 per mile, leaving net earnings of \$602,607,795, or \$3.091 per mile. The net earnings were \$51,395,421 greater than during the previous year.

The total income of the operating roads of the country, including \$82,714,492 derived from investment and miscellaneous sources, was \$688,331,287. The deductions from income aggregated \$458,459,961. This amount comprised interest on funded debt, rent on leased lines, betterments charged to income taxes of \$49,426,675, and various minor expenditures.

The dividends declared on stocks amounted to \$150,885,959, substantially \$25-34,690 greater than for the previous year. The surplus from the operations of the roads was \$76,188,367.

The complete report for the previous year gave a surplus of \$84,764,732. As this report relates to operating roads only, it does not include dividends paid by leased lines from the income they receive as rental.

### LETS RAILROAD CONTRACT

Wabash & Little Kanawha Arrange New Line in West Virginia.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 25.—The contract was awarded today by the Wabash and Little Kanawha railroads for the construction of seventy-one miles of railway connecting the Little Kanawha and the West Virginia Central. Clemens & Co., Philadelphia and J. Henry Miller of Baltimore secured the contract, which amounts to \$2,300,000.

The line will run from Sandy Bend to Burnsville, W. Va., from which point the line will connect with the West Virginia Central at Bellefleur. The work is to be completed within sixteen months. Contracts for the remainder of the road, 118 miles, will be let before February 1.

### MERGER CASE IS ADJOURNED

Northern Securities Submit Formal Evidence, Which State Objects To.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The federal suit against the Northern Securities company was resumed today in the federal court here. The defense submitted statements of changes in the rates of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific from 1890 to date, and the government objected on the ground that such a showing was not a guarantee for the future and therefore not pertinent.

The hearing was adjourned until December 1, to enable Mr. Ingersoll to make a trip to St. Paul.

### MORTGAGES COLORADO LINE

Cripple Creek District Raises Much Money for Improvements.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Nov. 25.—The Colorado Springs and Cripple Creek District railway today filed a mortgage given to the Morton Trust company, to cover a bond issue of \$3,600,000. The original first and second mortgage bonds are taken up by the new issue and \$1,000,000 additional raised to carry out extensive improvements. The new consolidated mortgage bonds are 5 per cent forty-year gold bonds.

### BAER DOES NOT GET JOB

Denies Report That He is to Succeed Walter as Lehigh President.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—George F. Baer, president of the Philadelphia & Reading, today denied that he had been elected president of the Lehigh Valley to take the place of Mr. Walter, who resigned last week.

When Mr. Baer was asked whether the report was true he replied, "No, and I never will be."

### Iowa Central Earnings.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—In its thirteenth annual report, just issued, the Iowa Central railroad shows total receipts of \$245,250, an increase of 11.32 per cent. Net earnings were \$88,581, an increase of 87.20 per cent. The surplus for the year shows an increase of \$194,081, making the total surplus \$324,543.

## DOCTOR HOWERTH'S LECTURE

Argues That Element of Competition is Not Permanent in Social System.

The lecture at the First Congregational church last night by Ira W. Howarth, Ph. D., was an argument to show that the element of competition in the social system, similar to the biological system, is of slow growth, obeying the laws of evolution and advancing toward perfection. The imperfection of society today is demonstrated by the fact of repressive forces. The speaker said, in the process of development, progress is not a straight line, but a zig-zag line, and the development which we now have toward progress is but a modification of the feeling which drove primitive man to war upon his fellows. This was shown to be due to the competitive principle, which while developing the intelligence, also develops cunning, shrewdness, craft, and leaves friendship, love, and sympathy undeveloped. That co-operation is a principle of nature was illustrated from Darwin's statement of the dependency of clover in England upon the number of cats in the country. The lecturer said the development of the social system, which means working together, which means feeling together, and from this results sympathy and love, the attributes of a perfect social system.

## In Omaha Public Schools

The teachers of Comenius school and a number of teachers from neighboring schools have taken up special work in blackboard drawing under the instruction of Miss Mae Hanning, Miss Hanning has made a special study of this branch, and under her direction the teachers are accomplishing much. The class meets every Thursday evening at 8 o'clock, working until dark.

The matter of blackboard work among the teachers is one that many of the principals of the city are giving special attention to late, and wherever this is the case there is a marked superiority in it. In Chicago, instances of the writing of the teachers is very poor, even carelessly so, and where this is the case there is very naturally a corresponding carelessness among the children. In speaking of this, one of the principals said: "No teacher would think of putting an incorrect example in arithmetic on the board. Why should she do so in blackboard work with my teachers at the beginning of last year and found a material improvement in the work of the children within a month. The first of the year there was some change in rooms, and I could detect a difference in the work of the children that had been moved. Little characteristics of the teachers had become a part of their work, and in using her example there was a difference in their work. This was especially noticeable among the children of the lower grades."

Miss Kate Wicken of the Kellom school expects to spend Thanksgiving and the remainder of the week in Chicago, and while there will devote her time to some investigation of constructive art work.

As something of an innovation in the Omaha schools, Miss Hitt, supervisor of drawing, has introduced within the month the use of water color crayons in several of the schools. As these materials are not furnished by the school board, they are only being used in rooms where the children care for them and provide them. They are at present being used in twenty rooms of six schools. The work is for the most part original and some princingly good landscape work has been done in the use of the primary colors. The children are told to draw a sky line, and then to lay in their colors. Sometimes only two colors are used, these being blended with excellent result. It was noticeable at its beginning that there was scarcely any difference between the work of the seventh and eighth grades and that of the children of the first. The work was new to all and the cautiousness of the elder children was a hindrance to results. For some time the children have been using colored crayons and have accomplished much with them.

## PRAISES LABOR UNIONS

President of Massachusetts Board of Trade Says Organization is Good.

### FAVORS ROOSEVELT'S TARIFF COMMISSION

English Delegates Warn Against High Duties, but Praise Shipping Trust as a Benefit to Great Britain.

BOSTON, Nov. 25.—In his report at the Massachusetts State Boards of Trade's annual meeting here today, Charles F. Adams endorsed the suggestion made by President Roosevelt last summer for the appointment of a national committee to consider matters of tariff legislation.

In speaking about labor he said: "The movement recently initiated among nonunion workmen to form a national association in the commencement of a forceful sentiment that will hasten a solution of the great question regarding the rights of all those who are constitutionally a part of this nation."

Resolutions favoring reciprocity with Canada were passed.

A delegation of business men from the London Chamber of Commerce, headed by Sir Vincent Barrington, were guests.

Sir Vincent, speaking of the shipping trust, said he believed it would prove of benefit to England in case of war with another nation.

Sir John Laurie advocated the open door in China.

Faithful F. Begg said if high tariff was maintained, the result would probably be a preferential trade agreement between England and its colonies.

Mr. Kenzie B. Murray, secretary of the London Chamber of Commerce, suggested the construction of a British-American commercial congress.
