It is thought that in the spring when the weather is warm and the cattle begin to hrive that after seven days the cattle will be clean and allowed to be moved into disinfected territory.

Should this be the case it will mean millions of dollars to the Texas Panhandle and all the territory along and below the quarantine line. The dip has no bad effect on the cattle whatever.
