Jury Awards Peterson Thirteen Thousand setting. This will be positively the last Dollars of Motor Company Oash.

TEN FAVORED A MUCH LARGER AMOUNT

Two Hold Out and Compromise is Reached After a Large Number of Ballots Had Been

Taken.

The district court jury before which was tried the personal injury damage suit of Chris Peterson against the Omaha & Council Bluffs Railway and Bridge company, brought in a sealed verdict yesterday afternoon, which will be opened by Judge Green on the convening of court this morning. It is said the verdict is in favor of the plaintiff, and awards him damage to the amount of \$13,000

The jury went out shortly before 3 o'clock number of ballots were taken before the amount of the verdict was reached. It is in favor of giving Peterson the full sum he sued for, namely \$35,000, and that at 4 o'clock yesterday morning the ballot stood 10 to 2 in favor of this amount. The minority of two, it is said, absolutely refused to agree to any such verdict and that the majority, rather than have another disagreement, finally compromised by agreeing

This was the second trial of the suit, on the former trial the jury failing to reach an agreement. Peterson, who was a painter by trade, lost his right arm at the shoulder and his left arm betwen the wrist and elbow, as the result of an accident on the motor company's bridge, two years ago. As a result of his injuries he is a helpless cripple.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.-The general sanitary convention of American republics will be held in this city during the pres-The convention is called in accordance

with resolutions passed at the meeting of the second international American conference held in the City of Mexico last January. Its object is to encourage friendly co-operation between health organizations of the several republics in the matter of quarantine and sanitation.

With regard to quarantine the delibera tions of the convention will have in view adequate protection against the introduction of disease from one country to another, while making quarantine of such a reasonable nature that it may be maintained with as little annoyance to persons the platform, and that is the last anyone and hindrance to commerce as possible.
