Lobeck Does Not Insist.

After the resolution had been attacked from all sides and the discussion had subsided the president asked Mr. Lobeck if he would like to speak. He replied that he did not see much use of talking.

The resolution, which Mr. Lobeck had introduced by him in good faith, was lost by 4 to 2, Mr. Mount being absent. The council authorized the city treasurer to sell to Spitzer & Co. of Toledo, at private sale, the prospective issue of \$200,000 of funding bonds...

The mayor's veto of a voucher to pay \$3,000 to the clerk of the district court in satisfaction of a judgment in the case of Richards against the city was sustained.

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NEW STREET CAR SECRETARY
