**Shields Case Submitted.**

**Good Will Mission Incorporated.**

Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state for the Mother Lee Good Will Mission Home for Penitent Fallen Women. The incorporators are: John W. Thomas, Hattie E. Lewis, L. C. Childs, Orleans, and R. A. Lee and Mary E. Coffey of Omaha. The company expects to establish homes at Omaha and Orleans. The object is to furnish homes for fallen women who desire to reform.

**Russell Verdict Affirmed.**

The supreme court affirmed the decision of the lower court in the case of Charles Russell, sentenced to twenty years in the penitentiary for the murder of Alton F. Standenbauer. The latter was found dead about three miles from his home in Sioux county and about six miles from the home of Russell. It was claimed by the state that Russell had waylaid Standenbauer as he was going to feed his cattle and shot him. He was convicted of murder in the second degree.

**Relatives Can Move Body.**

**CHANGE IN LAWS SUGGESTED**

Supervisors and Commissioners Hold Meeting at Beatrice.

**BUILDING OF BRIDGES IS DISCUSSED**

Creation of Insanity Board Composed of Certain County Officers to Act Without Extra Pay is Also Recommended.

**BEATRICE, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)**—The seventh annual convention of the State Association of Commissioners and Supervisors, which convened in this city yesterday, was called to order by the president, H. W. Winters of Madison county. The address of welcome was made by Hon. M. B. Davis, chairman of the Gage county republican central committee, after which the regular business of the meeting was then taken up, and the report of the committee on legislation submitted. Among the recommendations made by the committee on legislation, is one that the laws governing the construction of bridges be so amended that boards may purchase materials and construct bridges, or build them as to them seems best, instead of having to let the contract by the foot, as under the present system; another is that an insanity board be created composed of the county clerk, one member of the county board, county attorney and county physician, who shall act without extra pay; another is to enable county boards to purchase lands which have been offered at sale, and upon which there are no bidders, and resold them to the highest bidder, as provided in these lands they are to be offered and sold to the highest bidder.

At the evening session another measure that was favorably considered, was to give jurisdiction over certain conditions, jurisdiction over the public highways leading to them a distance of six miles beyond the corporate limits of said city, and to vote taxes for the purpose of macadamizing them. Another measure is to so amend the road law as to do away with special commissioners and appraisers in laying out new roads, and to give boards power to do the work, and to shorten the time in which the same may be done. Many other matters of more or less importance were taken up and discussed at the evening session.

The State Association of Supervisors and Commissioners which convened here yesterday afternoon, adjourned at noon today to meet in Omaha, January 20, next. The proposed laws submitted by the legislative committee at the sessions yesterday afternoon and last evening were taken up and discussed at this morning's session. Most of them were adopted, and the legislative committee was instructed to present them to the coming session of the legislature. About twenty counties were represented in the convention.

**WHITE COVERING OVER STATE**

Rain in the Morning Turns to Snow and is General Over Nebraska.

**LINCOLN, Dec. 3.—**A warm rain last night turned into a snowstorm, and all over Nebraska today a snowfall is raging. In the west and northwest along the lines of the Burlington and Northwestern roads the telegraph communications are being continually broken, and if the blizzard continues train service will be stopped within a few hours.

The storm has turned into a fierce blizzard in the sandhills country.

There are great fears that the school children attending district schools in that section may suffer.

**KEARNEY, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special Telegram.)**—The storm which struck this part of the state last night was very severe for the first of a winter season, the snow being two and three feet thick where it had drifted, and the zero mark was only eight degrees to the good. The trains on the Union Pacific were from three to ten hours late. No damage is reported by the telephone lines.

**BUTTE, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special Telegram.)**—A furious blizzard has been raging all day and shows no sign of abating. The weather is warm and the snow soft, but if it gets cold stock will suffer. The town is short on coal, but not entirely out.

**PORT DODGE, Ia., Dec. 3.—(Special Telegram.)**—Almost a blizzard raged here for several hours on Tuesday night. The snow was two inches on the level and drifted badly before a sweeping north wind. Railroad traffic, telegraph and telephone service were only slightly impeded by the storm. Work on a number of improvements about the city has been stopped for the present.

**DAVID CITY, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)**—Yesterday afternoon it commenced snowing and continued until late last night, with a strong northwest wind about three inches of snow fell and it drifted badly. The mercury registered near the zero mark. Today it has quit snowing, but the weather is still cold.

**EDGAR, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)**—A severe storm is in progress here this morning. The wind changed suddenly yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock, from south to north-west, and the temperature has fallen from 40 to 5 degrees, and is falling. About four inches of snow has fallen and is quite badly drifted.

**FREMONT, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)**—About four inches of snow fell last night and as it turned cold a strong north wind during the night it drifted badly. Trains were delayed on both roads. The Bonstead passenger on the Elkhorn, due here at 8:50, did not get in until about 2 this afternoon, and all other trains on the line except the Lincoln passenger were delayed. Westbound trains on the Union Pacific were also late.

**SCHUYLER, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)**—The first storm of severity struck here last night, beginning with a fall of snow, which was kept up until about three inches had fallen. A north wind sprang up and the increasing strength and coldness throughout the night had all of the snow that fell drifted and the mercury was down to within 5 degrees of zero by morning. The roads were so blocked in places that some people coming to town were obliged to drive through fields. Weather now clear and moderating rapidly.

**LEIGH, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)**—The severest storm so far this season began here yesterday afternoon with snow and sleet, increasing toward night with more snow and wind. This morning the snow is drifting badly and the wind is still blowing a gale from the northwest. The thermometer stood at zero early this morning.

**SHELTON, Neb., Dec. 3.—(Special.)**—A light rain fell almost all day Tuesday, which turned to snow in the evening, and accompanied by high wind and increased cold, continued throughout last night, and it is still snowing this morning, with the mercury at almost zero. This is the heaviest storm at this early part of the winter for ten years past, as there are banks of snow two feet deep.
