The officials at the asylum profess to be somewhat relieved at the prospects for a continuous supply, but the danger line will not be passed until a thirty days' supply can be secured. An official said that in case of a blizzard, blocking traffic for a few days, the coal supply would give out, with scrious consequences to the inmates
