Ranges and Leaves Plenty of Feed,

PIERRE, S. D., Jan. 18 .- (Special.)-Riders from all portions of the range country bring reports which would indicate that with the heavy snowfall in December the stockmen were some of them yelling before they were hurt. The chinook wind of last week somewhat materially reduced the amount of snow, and this, followed by the thawing weather which has prevailed this week, has opened up a large part of the range country which was covered, leaving only a small territory south of this city which is not now in excellent shape, while in that section the tops of the hills and high places on the prairie are opened for grazing. No dead cattle are reported.




