It shows that out of a total of 271 cases in the city there were 89 convictions, 48 acguittals, 87 dismissals and 47 still pending. The total costs amounted to \$1,778.43, being an average of \$6.56 a case. There were 70 cases in the county outside the city, resulting in 33 convictions, 20 acquittals, 8 dismissals and 9 still pending. Outside the city the cents amounted to \$766.68, or an average of \$10.95 a case.
